#### Christmas address from Mr Brailsford – Headteacher

As 2024 ends, all of those connected with National have a great deal to celebrate. If I were to summarise the main headlines, here are 7 impressive and exciting things to be aware about from this year.

- 1. National students achieved their best GCSE results for 8 years.
- 2. Planning permission was given for a brand new Sixth Form which is due to open in 2025. We have invested over £2m in a purpose built Sixth Form to support our students further.



- 3. With your help, we won several nationally recognised attendance awards this year. We are recognised in the top 25% of all schools nationally for attendance.
- 4. Our 'Progress 8' figure was above the national average. This means that the progress our students make between KS2 and KS4 is above most other secondary schools nationally.
- 5. Our students continue to access a wide range of extra-curricular trips and visits including the WW2 battlefields trip, theatre visits, university experiences, performing at the Royal Concert Hall, ski trip to Italy, Hagg Farm, Galleries of Justice, sports events, wildlife centres and RS London trip to name only a few
- 6. Our Academy remains an incredibly popular choice for parents and guardians and it continues to grow in stature and reputation across Nottinghamshire. In the last 5 years the numbers attending our open evening have almost doubled to 733 for one night.
- 7. We end the term celebrating student achievements including 449 students who have received no behaviour points this term and 238 students who have 100% attendance.

As the year comes to an end and we reflect on what a positive year it has been, we also acknowledge that for many, including those abroad and in our local community, this has been a tough year for a variety of reasons. Our thoughts and prayers are with all of those who are struggling at this time and we pray they have a more positive 2025.





# **Year 9 Battlefields Trip**

Each year, year 9 have the opportunity to visit the sites of the Western Front from WW1. This year our trip ran from 15th - 17th October. We have three key aims during this trip, to deepen the students learning from their study into WW1, encourage students to reflect on the meaning of compassion and to broader the students experience outside of the classroom. Our rather early start was worth it when we reached our first site at Zonnebeke and the fantastic Passchendaele War Museum. The dugouts here are maintained from WW1 and really show the nature of trench warfare.





Day two began with setting the context around the 1915 Ypres offensive and reflected the loss here. A visit to the Essex Farm Cemetery had an instant impact with students learning about the death of the youngest British soldier "Studwick" who died at 16 years, as well as the site where John McCrae first penned the poem "In Flanders Fields".

We then skirted Ypres to visit two contrasting cemeteries. Tyne Cot Memorial showed the gravity and scale of loss. The attitude to mourning in this British graveyard was completely different to the contrasting German cemetery at Langemark. With its gravestones contrasting with the white spacious feel at Tyne Cot, it highlighted how the two nations do remembrance in a different way. Hill 62 is indicative of the Battle of Ypres. Any watchers of War Horse will remember the

horses dragging an artillery piece up an escarpment that overlooked the town of Ypres. Such a hill was key to winning the battle. Hill 62 was one such hill and saw great loss on both sides. Today it gives an insight into trench warfare and holds an exhibit of images not seen elsewhere.

Having skirted around Ypres all morning we arrived in the beautiful market square. Some free time around the remarkable town square at Ypres was followed by another dive into trench warfare with a scout around the 'In Flanders Fields Museum'. A large museum with the purpose of commemorating the many men that fought in the war. Hungry again, a quick hop back for dinner gave the group the substance to head back

to Ypres to partake in the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate; a granite arch that commemorates the journey of British soldiers as they left Ypres for the front line. In sombre mood, we watched the last post ceremony which was very touching. Some of our students laid a wreath on behalf of the school.

Our last day took us south along the old front line to the river Somme. We had studied this battle in our history lessons but to see the scale of loss in such a small area was sobering. We arrived amidst some overcast conditions and not the sunny skys of 1916. Thie pval Memorial holds the names of 72,000 missing soldiers. A powerful image of loss.

On the 1st July 1916 the British & Commonwealth soldiers were formed into "Pals" battalions. Therefore soldiers often fought for the first time with their friends, family or work colleagues. Newfoundland Park preserves a section of the battlefield as it was in 1916. It gives you a great insight into why the losses were so significant. All that was left to do was a return by ferry back to waiting parents. 60 outstanding students and their proud 6 staff arrived back to bleary eyed parents.





### White Post Farm Visit

White Post Farm came to visit school on Tuesday 12th November with some of their lovely animals. A small group of students were invited to stay after school to meet and learn about different kinds of animals, how to care for them and how they live in the wild. In this session we met three very cute

guinea pigs Oreo, Hattie and Aida.

#### Bookbuzz

#### **Carnegie Book Awards Judging**

Our school librarian, Mrs Prestwood is the East Midlands judge for the prestigious Carnegie book awards again this year, and she has been busy reading the 119 books nominated for the writing and illustration awards in her free time. This is her second and final year as a judge, which she has enjoyed very much!

The Carnegies are the UK's longest running and best-loved children's book awards, judged solely by librarians. The awards recognise outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in books for children and young people.

Mrs Prestwood has received physical copies of all 119 books nominated and will donate all of the books to the Academy library once the judging is over. This adds to the 129 books she read and donated last year! So our students will be able to read and enjoy all of the books too.

The shortlists will be announced on 11th March 2025 and the winners announced on 19th June 2025

# **Faculty Blog - Languages**

"Learning another language is not only learning different words for the same things, but learning another way to think about things." - Flora Lewis

I begin my blog this year with a quote from Flora Lewis an influential American journalist of the 20th century. As the language's faculty, we believe all language is valuable and we aim to ensure our students have the right words and approaches to view the world from multiple perspectives with understanding and compassion and we strive for this daily in our lessons and with all our students. We had another busy year last year, utilising the opportunities to get our students out and experiencing language in as many different settings as we can and we will continue to do this as much as possible beyond our curriculum time.

Our first faculty trip was led by Mrs Bust in the Advent term who took a German GSCE group to the Christmas markets of Aachen and Cologne and then Mrs Guest took the year 9 group in the Pentecost term to Germany to stay in Boppard with a visit to Koblenz where they experienced a gondola over the Rhine. Both excursions got to experience the lovely Lindt chocolate and had the opportunity to visit Cologne's famous cathedral.

We have continued to review our curriculums and are proud to be offering German as an A Level this year, building upon the continued success of our key stage 3 and 4 German lessons. The Modern Foreign Language lessons are making fantastic progress with the continued use of the Conti teaching method and the classrooms are a buzz of activity and excitement as students practice their target language. In English, we have continued to review our text offerings in key stage 3 to ensure we are looking at a wide range of current social issues but also using literature as window to explore different cultural periods so for example our year 8 students are taken back to the Japanese Sengoku period and the conflicts experienced. Whilst our year 9 students have been very much in the present and have enjoyed studying their first full verse narrative, exploring modern issues that we see spoken about on our daily news feeds and channels. We are continuing through the year to update our text choices exploring memoirs in both year 9 and 10 and we hope the students continue to share their positive experiences with their teachers.

As we did last year, a number of theatre visits are planned and we will be taking year 8 to see &Juliet in 2025 and year 7 to see a performance of A Christmas Carol in December. The Germany trip is already on the go and Mrs Guest is finalising this for the summer term. This has been reflected in the number of achievement points received as a year group – as it stands at the time of writing year 7 have accumulated 19,058 achievement points – this is an outstanding achievement and I am very proud of them as a year group. So far, I have awarded 119 Bronze Certificates and 28 Silver Certificates. # **Head of Year Highlights**

#### Year 9

At the start of this year, we welcomed Mr Crossland to the year team as assistant head of year in replacement of Miss Bird who left us at the end of the last academic year. Mr Crossland is an experienced, dedicated AHOY and we are fortunate to have him support the year group as we enter this important final year of key stage 3 studies before options for GCSE are made.

Year 9 have really hit the ground running with improvements on last year's attendance and behaviour compared to this time last year. At the time of writing, the average attendance for year 9 stands at 92.3%, which is just above the national average for the year group. 9C are at the top of this table as a form group with an impressive 96% attendance rate! We also currently have 60 year 9 students who have 100% attendance since the start of the school year, which is just over 25% of the year group.

In the classroom year 9 have earned over 11,000 achievement points with 9B continuing to lead the way as they did last year with over 3,000 positive points already this year. The top 5 students this year; of which 4 are from 9B are: Zachary B, Blake H, Cohen G, Kai F, Shakiyah M who have each individually earned over 170 net points this term. Special recognition goes to Zachary B for leading this table with over 240 points already.

We look ahead to an exciting time in year 9 when the students will have their first opportunity to have their choice of subjects to study as they engage in the options process. For the first time in their education journey, they will get to impact their own future. Well done to all year 9 students for their hard work and achievements at the start of this term and in returning to school with such a positive mindset.

This term year 10 have been visited by staff from the University of Nottingham who delivered an assembly on higher education and what to expect from University life; 29 year 10 students enjoyed a residential trip to London, visiting several places of worship and having the opportunity to see some of the sights; and members of the year 10 student council have also planned a visit Annesley Lodge Care Home for a host of Christmas activities with the residents there, including bingo, a quiz and Christmas crafts.

Well done to all year 10's for each of their positives this term, and enjoy the Christmas break.

### **News from HSFC**


From Monday 11th – Tuesday 12th November 2024 the majority of our Art and Photography year 12 and 13 cohort attended a trip to London.
